
YOU CAN'T AFFORD HER

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

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

On the flip side, her Biggest green flag is attention to detail. "It's the small things that count," she says. "If someone remembers little details about you—your favorite coffee order, a random story you told weeks ago—that's real effort." Unlike many of her peers, Makenna has never used dating apps. While she understands their appeal, she remains skeptical about finding real connection through an algorithm. "I get why people use them—it's convenient," she says. "But for me, I'd rather meet someone organically." Many Gen Z daters share Makenna's sentiment. Minimal accessories, add just the right amount of sparkle, allowing the outfit and her natural elegance to take center stage.




